While my mom was pregnant with me she was actually attending the New York School of Interior Design. Many believe my career decision was due to the prenatal design training I was exposed to early on.

My first memory of design was during a family trip to Austria. We visited a beautiful famous castle and I was fascinated by the details in the design and the ornate furnishings.

Every summer, my family vacationed in South Carolina. My parents would attempt to drive through the night, occasionally taking short rests at the car park. My mother and father were able to recline but us kids had

The project I am most looking forward to completing is the Renaissance in Harlem. New York. It's in a neighborhood that has an incredibly rich history and situated on a site that's being integrated within the Victoria Theater, a landmark just doors down from the famous Apollo Theater.

Most challenging part of the job: making the decision that will be in the best interest for all parties involved. Most rewarding part of the job: an elated client.
